The CSDDD: When campaign wins disappoint

On Friday, the E.U. took a small step towards corporate justice with the European Council's endorsement of the Corporate Sustainability Due Diligence Directive (CSDDD), which aims to put responsibility on companies to combat modern slavery and forced labor in supply chains inter alia.

This directive is crucial to ensuring people and planet are put above profit. It integrates measures including living income requirements and ethical purchasing practices, called for by our community.

Moreover, the directive's **explicit prohibitions against the worst forms of child labor and the employment of children below the age of compulsory schooling** are critical steps toward reversing trends in increasing child labor exploitation.

However, the **journey toward a world free of modern slavery is far from over.** The watered-down agreement, following corporate influence and political maneuvering, significantly **narrows the directive's scope by only applying to companies at least double the size originally proposed.**

Now, the **CSDDD would only apply to a small fraction of one percent of European companies, approximately 5,500.** Previously, **70% of companies who would have been captured by the deal that was reached in December 2023, are now exempt from the directive**. This compromise is a stark **reminder of the challenges we face in our pursuit of justice and accountability.**

Freedom United urges the European Parliament to fortify the CSDDD, making robust protections against exploitation non-negotiable. The **E.U. must prove its dedication to eliminating modern slavery and forced labor from its supply chains**, upholding human rights across all sectors of the global economy.

The fight against modern slavery and human rights is ongoing, and together, we will prevail.
